I BOW!

The Calvinist emphasizes God's electing love while the Arminian emphasizes that God loves the whole world. Does God desire that everyone be saved or just the elect? Can sovereign election be harmonized with universal love? I contend that both are true, but in ways that are past finding out.

This "tension" is reflected in the following quotes. Note that quoting someone does not mean I fully embrace their views but only that I think they are making a thoughtful point regarding the biblical "tensions" in view.

"One of the deep concerns that has prompted me to write this book is a growing trend I have noticed – particularly among people committed to the biblical truth of God's sovereignty and divine election. Some of them flatly deny that God in any sense loves those whom He has not chosen for salvation." – **John MacArthur**: THE LOVE OF GOD, p. 12.

"Yet if I seem to dwell on this issue, it is because I want to acknowledge that it poses a perplexing difficulty for other aspects of God's revealed truth. Let us honestly admit that on the face of it, the universal love of God is hard to reconcile with the doctrine of election."--John MacArthur: THE LOVE OF GOD, p. 110

Consistency is essential to proper thinking. However, a problem often emerges regarding the antinomies of Scripture, especially in regard to the biblical tensions concerning God's sovereignty (Calvinism emphasis) and human responsibility (Arminian emphasis).

This challenge becomes especially apparent when we discuss the role of prayer and the reality of God's love. Neatly sewn systems are, at that point, shown to have some "loose" ends. Wisdom, at this point, bows in humility before the awesomeness of God! I worship a God so GREAT I don't have Him all figured out! I bow!
