HOLDING TO A "MYSTERY VIEW"

Throughout the centuries, theological battles have raged around God's SOVEREIGNTY and human RESPONSIBILITY. The battle is over how to harmonize these two realities, which are both clearly presented in Scripture. At the end of the day, I emphasize God's sovereignty above all, but at the same time, I acknowledge the reality of human responsibility.

I am with those who hold to a "mystery view" which lends itself to a BIBLICALLY-BALANCED theology that is consistent with the whole counsel of God.

In my view, only a God-centered theology that is consistent with the tensions of an inductive Bible study can be called 'Theology Proper'.

The story is told of a soldier during the Civil War who could not make up his mind about which side of the conflict he supported. So, he dressed in a blue coat (the color of the Union) and gray pants (the color of the Confederates), and walked down the center of the battlefield thinking he would receive the approval of both sides. He was wrong and was immediately shot by both sides.

This illustrates the position of the "Biblicist" who seeks to properly hold to the tensions of Scripture regarding God's sovereignty and human responsibility. He gets shot at from both sides and yet in the end is faithful to the whole counsel of God as one who rightly divides the Word of God concerning the ways of God that are "past finding out".

Romans 11:33 is a verse that some (in practical reality) refuse to accept, but it too is part of the whole counsel of God and in CONTEXT comes at the conclusion of Paul's prolonged discussion regarding God's sovereignty and human responsibility as seen in Romans 9-11. Some get hung up on the "sovereign emphasis" of Romans 9, others make their focus the "responsibility emphasis" of Romans 10; but in biblical balance I want the truth of both with the inspired conclusion of Romans 11 which emphasizes all is of God, but His ways are past finding out.

"I'm in the middle and I can't solve the riddle."

There are various shades of Calvinism, various shades of Arminianism, various shades of Molinism, various shades of Corporate Election, and on and on. All of these systems do their best to try and figure out the seeming antinomy that exists between God's sovereignty and human responsibility,

and yet in all these systems there is what I call a "**blessed inconsistency**". There is some truth (or perhaps much) in these various systems of thought and yet the FULL truth is deeper than any of them.

I start with the presupposition that God is always RIGHT! Even if I don't understand it – God is RIGHT! Who are we to argue with God (Rom. 9:20)? At the end of the day, we bow in humility before God and His truth. His thoughts are not our thoughts and His ways are infinitely higher than our ways (Isa. 55:8-9).

He plainly tells us that "His ways are past finding out" (Rom. 11:33). Faith is taking God at His Word. Whatever God says is true and I take Him at His Word, even though I freely admit there are many things I can't completely comprehend (cf. Job 42:3).

Ultimate reality/truth rests in God, and whatever He says, I fully agree with it. That is why I call myself a "Biblicist," desiring to follow the whole counsel of God wherever it leads, including the truth that some things are past finding out. The pinnacle of truth is that "of Him and through Him and to Him are all things, to whom be glory forever. Amen." (Rom. 11:36)
